





Allears

Having a nice view from your balcony is always a plus, especially among the city jungle. A way to enjoy it even more is to adapt the space for multiple purposes. Put a nice couch, maybe a few comfy cushions, and voila! You have a reading or knitting nook like no other. Just do not forget to use weather proof materials.

meganfranc

One of the more recent trends when it comes to the designing of outdoor spaces like decks and verandas is to "bring the inside out". Creating an outdoor living area can be both fun and interesting, not to mention the endless possibilities to experiment with different styles. Plus, when having guests over, some extra space can always come in handy.



bschh

Nowadays the look of red bricks is almost classic, but when used as a primary exterior pattern it can come across as a bit outdated. Then again, when you combine it with some modern colors like white and black it might turn out to be exactly what you need to tidy up the loose ends and give your backyard a one-of-a-kind look. Why choose between modern and classic when you can have both?

No backyard is complete without some greenery. The choice of the right plants, however, can be challenging for every gardening enthusiast. A very easy solution in this case is to go with a combination of planters with plants in full bloom. This way you can move them around until you are satisfied and plant the bushes or flowers in the ground only when you are absolutely sure of their positions. The result will be simple, but effective.

By enclosing a part of your porch with the help of some smartly-placed moving floor-to-ceiling doors and windows you can create a space that can be used all times of the year. Keep the doors open during the summer and close them during the winter and you've got yourself a nice addition to both the house and backyard.




INTERVIEW: PaisleyAvenue

PaisleyAvenueRedux is definitely a tumblr page to drool over. Once you open it, you are tempted to stay there and spend as long as it takes to scroll over all the pages plus download all the awesome custom content. Which means you'll be there forever.

With gorgeous shots, remarkable sense of color, superb editing, and high quality custom content for both TS2 and TS3, PaisleyAvenue is certainly a designer to get to know. I recently sat down with her for a little conversation on who she is in real life and how she works her magic in the Sims community.

Q: You are known as paisleyavenue at your tumblr. Can you tell us about the person behind this username?

A: I used to be super fond of paisley patterns, and so I decided to use it plus avenue when I started creating. I am not so fond of paisley patterns now though, lol!

Well, I think most simmers who follow me know by now that my real name is Mari. I am obsessed with interior design and decorating, and so the stuff that I cannot do to my house in real life, I do them all via the sims. Aside from simming, I love to read and watch films, and I cannot live without Wi-Fi!

Q: How long have you been playing The Sims? And which of the games is your favourite?

A: Oh gosh, I've been playing since the first Sims game, let's see, 14 years? I feel so old now! The Sims 2 will always have a special place in my heart because that's where I started making CC. I play Sims 3 right now, but Sims 2 is my favorite.

Q: How would you describe your style? What inspires you?

A: I would describe my style as Boho eclectic. I like mixing things - that's why my favorite design blog is [sfgirbythebay](#). It's my go-to site when I am lacking inspiration and creativity when decorating for the Sims.





Q: Your interiors are very precise and well-planned. Each also has a unique character. Can you tell me a little about your creative process?

A: I am really slow when it comes to decorating. Sometimes I'd get messages asking me if I can maybe decorate their lots for them, and I would be telling them that I shouldn't because it's just gonna take me forever.

But here's what I do most of the time: I tend to browse interior tumblr and blogs first to look for inspiration, then afterward I load the game and browse the objects catalog, picking things I think I might use later on. When that is done, I rearrange everything as I see fit. I can be really fickle sometimes, and just choosing a sofa can take me forever. When I am satisfied with how things look, that's when I start taking screenshots.









Q: Your interiors are always full of color. What color, or color combos do you prefer the most?

A: Yes I like colors. I can never pull off monochromatic design schemes because I just can't live without a pop of color in a room! But you don't want to overdo it.

My favorite color combo would have to be the colors on the Acapulco-like chair I recently released; yellow, blue and orange really looked nice together paired with the green color of the Hay Bjorn sofa by Milla.

Q: What is the room you tend to decorate first while working on a project?

A: I tend to start with either the living room or the kitchen as they're my favorite rooms to decorate.

Q: What inspired you to start making your own CC?

A: I started with recoloring because sometimes you'd find a great object mesh but the textures do not really fit your design aesthetic. Instead of waiting for another creator to do it for me, I decided to do it myself.

Q: We'll skip the "CC-or-no-CC" question, but are there any Expansion (EP) or Stuff Pack (SP) items you can't live without?

A: I just started playing Sims 3, so I am not familiar with all the EP or SP items in the game. I use CC most of the time. But with Sims 2, the Ikea SP items are a must-have for me.

Q: Your pictures look so real. Could you share some of your photography and editing tips?

A: All thanks to Photoshop! But seriously there are tons of simmers who have way more superior editing skills than I do. But here's what I do: I use Creative Suite 6 (CS6) and start with applying the 'topaz clean softy' preset by Josie/thenoisyneutron.

Then I adjust the curves and do selective color; most of the time I only touch the neutrals and the blacks. Then I use the brush tool for highlighting (overlay) and shadows (multiply). You can also use the dodge tool (highlights) and the burn tool (shadows). Lastly, I use the blur tool on areas that don't need much focus and apply smart sharpen.



3 Colours

When it comes to interior design, probably one of the hardest colours to use is blue and all of its variations. Too much of it might be hard on the eyes, and even large spaces can feel cramped and claustrophobic. Too little might fade among every other color and lose its purpose. This is where the Colour Theory we revised in the previous issue can come in handy. This time in 3 Colours, we will show you an analogous colour scheme in blues that will hopefully inspire you to be a little more daring when it comes to designing interior spaces.





The three main living spaces in every home are the kitchen, living and dining areas. Those are the spaces where a family spends the most of their time when at home, so they have to be both functional and comfortable at the same time. This also often makes them very hard to decorate by default. Talk about being brave!

First and foremost, choose a base colour that will provide the "blank canvas" on which you are going to paint. In this case, we are using a combination of a natural and neutral colour - white and wood. They have the purpose of not only smoothing the hard and vibrant blues and teals, but also act as a medium between all of them and thus help them work together not against each other.

The result is a well balanced splash of colours, that manages to generate the feelings of calmness and softness, that is both inviting and pleasing. In fact, I am sure that even looking at the pictures you can feel all the stress of the busy everyday drain away to make space for a more warm and cozy feeling.


This may sound like a bit of a contradiction since blue is usually considered a rather “cold” color, and that is where the use of the analogous teal steps in. Very often, it is a hue associated with the colour of the ocean, which in turn makes us think of long sandy beaches and sunny days. And that is when the magic of this colour scheme truly starts to happen.

Try to achieve a similar effect in your designs, and you will know for sure how much of the colour theory you truly understand. Now, who is ready for a walk on the beach?



Just as we are about to fall down memory lane, almost accidentally, we stomp upon a hidden treasure: a designer and creator who literally sweeps us off our feet with their creativity and eye for detail, just in time to remind us that the Sims 2 still has many amazing things to offer.

Today we will be interviewing yet another such designer. A true gem not only among the Sims 2 players, but among the Sims community in general. Give a big round of applause for simSbiotic a.k.a kacicka777!

Q: So, tell us something about yourself.

A: Hi! here you are: a few basic facts about me. My name is Pavli. I am 26 years old and live on Slovakia in a three-room flat. I try to decorate it as my Sims houses but to be honest, it is more difficult than in the game. I am a doctor and work with newborns. Less formal facts: I am a bookish person, a vegetarian and I love walks in nature and cappuccino.

Q: Why the Sims?

A: Because it is a genial game without an end. Because you can live hundreds of lives in a hundred forms. Because it allows me to be creative while decorating houses or creating custom content (CC).

Q: When did you start playing?

A: About 10 years ago thanks to my sister, who is a hard-core gamer. She showed me The Sims 1 and I was delighted by that game, even though I hadn't played PC games before. And then, The Sims 2 came out, and it was love at first sight. Of course, I tried Sims 3 and 4 too, but didn't experience the same passion.

Q: Which part of the game do you like the most?


A: I either play with my families (now they are in their 5th generation,) or decorate a new house, or create CC. I like all of these activities equally and alternate between them from time to time.





Q: What are your most favorite design styles?
A: Scandinavian, industrial, and vintage style. Thanks to DOTY (Designer of the Year) at Sim-Pearls, I was able to try more different styles and I found out how difficult it is to follow features of a particular design.

Q: Interior or exterior? Or maybe both?
A: Definitely interior. I am terrible at making exteriors. I am thankful for Ohbehave's gorgeous backdrop; my outer space would suffer without it.



Q: Custom content or no custom content?

A: Custom content. I doubt that I used a Maxis object in my last ten houses. Since I have new notebook with full HD resolution, I prefer CC because I like working with high quality textures and I can create more realistic

interiors. My download folder contains over 25,000 items and needs regular maintenance because I love CC hunts.





Q: Where do you get your inspiration from?

A: Mainly from Pinterest and various internet pages about interior design. I also notice interiors used in films (I love Bilbo's Hobbit hole) and watch programs about living. Spaces I create should be believable but original.

Q: Do you have any advice for our readers or any future players of The Sims?

A: Sure. Dear readers, whether you play, build, decorate or create Simmies, the most important thing is to have fun. So, happy Simming!



Opal's eyes are dancing with excitement as she throws open the doors to the Corner Ice Cream Café and beckons the large crowd waiting outside to enter. This day is one that she's dreamed of for years, and it's finally arrived.

A mother of three and grandmother to seven, Opal has lived a full and happy life. When she married and began having children she, like many women of her generation, left the workplace behind to run her family and home. She always had a love for cooking and baking though, something her children and husband adored about her.

Big John Blankenship, Opal's husband and the love of her life, had been encouraging her to open up a café for years. It was always something they planned to do... right after the next family trip or after the next grandchild was born. When Big John passed away two years ago, Opal decided they'd waited long enough and began planning to make her dream into a reality.


When it's my turn, I order a chocolate waffle cone with two scoops of caramel balsamic swirl. And fresh berries on top, of course.



Tips for Making Bank in Your Sims 4 Restaurant

- Place mostly tables that seat two to three patrons. It is rare that larger groups show up to be seated.
- There's no need for a fridge.
- You can easily set your mark-up very high. Even up to 175% is no problem, not even in starter restaurant. You might even be able to go higher than that.
- Don't set menu items that require a higher cooking skill than what your chef has. The chef will get better over time, and you can always add more menu items - and you definitely should.
- Remember to upgrade the level of both food and beverages as time goes on.
- Remember to buy a large trash can - otherwise your restaurant will get icky.
- Promoting a staffer will create jealousy, so be ready promote all of them or they will get grumpy. Grumpy staff might quit without warning, so remember to check often on how they are feeling about their workplace.
- Remember, you can stop seating people when your staff is overwhelmed, or when you get close to closing time - three hours or so ahead of time. This will allow your staff to catch up and will ensure that the customers finish eating, so you can get paid.
- Must-have perks: Patient Patrons & Curious Customers.
- Consider setting higher priced menu items to allow for bigger payoffs per seating. This means that you should prioritize having main menu items rather than starters and deserts, as starters and desserts are cheaper.
- Your start-up should be able to handle about five tables without too much trouble. Your chef cooks per table, not per customer; therefore, bigger groups earn you more money. As you hire more staff, you will be able to handle more tables.



This restaurant has all the elements you need to run a successful starter restaurant.

- Objects which grant fun or comfort (those not part of seating arrangements) will distract your customers from ordering and give a lower table turn over.
- Consider having a staff room for your own sim where they can work on creative projects. Remember to lock the door to keep nosy patrons out.
- Remember to have some child friendly beverages, otherwise they will order free water. We wouldn't want anyone order healthy water instead of costly beverages - this is about capitalism after all.
- In the actual kitchen part of the restaurant, you only need the cooking station - everything else is just for looks. While in the front of the restaurant though, your customers will love a well decorated room. This even includes your own finger paintings.

Did You Know?

- You can change your customers attire to match your restaurant. So if you are running a beachside ice bar, you can set your customers clothing options to bathing suits.
- At the end of the workday, you can see how happy your staff is and if they have learned any new skills. Keep an eye on this.
- While kids wait for their food, they will color their placemat. You can hang these in the restaurant - it's so cute.
- If your sims order food on black plates, they have a chance of learning these experimental dishes.
- Your waiters will seat people at the smallest possible table, so the couple coming in will be seated at a two-top table, rather than at the six-top table whenever possible.
- Small items can be placed in the middle of the table without it interfering with the dinners. So you can place candles, flowers or salt and pepper on the tables.




The "Mythic Patio Warming Lamp"

- You can change your staff's outfits to fit the restaurant's theme. The ice bar has nostalgic dinner uniforms while your white tie restaurant has the wait staff in tuxedos.

Object Placement

- If you are using the dinner corner booths, don't add chairs as well. They will not work.
- The waiter station doesn't need room in front of it, while the host station does.
- "IDream of Sous" chef station can be placed in a corner without any problems.
- The "Mythic Patio Warming Lamp" will give your sims a nice warm buff.

CHEESY EYEBALLS

INGREDIENTS:

2 cups grated Cheddar
1 stick unsalted butter
1 cup all-purpose flour
1 teaspoon Creole season
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/8 teaspoon cayenne
24 pimento-stuffed green olives, drained and patted dry

PREPARATION:

Preheat the oven to 400 degrees F. Line a large baking sheet with parchment paper. In a large bowl, cream together the cheese and butter. In a separate bowl, sift together the flour, Creole season, salt, and cayenne. Fold into the cheese mixture and blend until combined. Drop the dough by tablespoonfuls onto the prepared sheet and shape into an oblong, almond-like shape to resemble an eye. With the handle of a wooden spoon, make an indentation in the center of each "eye." Place 1 olive in each indentation, turning the pimento side up to resemble an eyeball. Bake until golden and set, 12 to 15 minutes, rotating the pan halfway through baking.

Remove from the oven and serve warm or at room temperature.
